or different people, the expression "the American Dream" elicits different images. Although there is still discussion and debate about what the dream is and has become, it is an idea held by many that through hard work, courage and determination one can achieve prosperity.

Such is the conviction of María Quintanilla, who arrived at the Hispanic Family Ministry with a dream that today is on the verge of being realized. María, who was born in El Salvador, has lived in the United States for the past fourteen years. She came to the Hispanic Family Ministry to register for a course that prepares students for the written and oral exam as part of the process of obtaining their American citizenship.

According to Pastor Jorge de Casanova, instructor of the Citizenship class, over the four months of the course Maria made the remarkable commitment to learn not only the answers to the 100 written questions, but also to the oral questions most likely to be asked. "This is particularly noteworthy because her command of the English language is limited," said Pastor de Casanova. When asked what fuels her determination to overcome language barriers, Maria said, "I am a Christian and my faith has enabled me to put into practice the verse that says, 'I can do all things through Christ who strengthens me.""

María plans to register for ESL classes in the fall to continue her education. Pastor de Casanova says, "Maria is a model student in various ways—for her attendance, punctuality, diligence and above all for her spiritual

Likewise, as our resources increased during the 1990s and the new century, doors have opened for other training and education opportunities for the Mission family.


To reenter society as fully functional and responsible individuals, our men need skills for work. Many need to learn to read and do basic math, others need more advanced training in fields where they already have some skill, and most need to become familiar with computers regardless of their field. Many of these needs are met through cooperation with Education. We are blessed by the other agencies that broaden educational opportunities at the Mission.

Our Hispanic community is also in need of training and education. Many individuals are learning to read in Spanish, a needed step before they can be functional in English. Others are taught such practical items as healthy hygiene and how to apply for a job.

We see a great need to encourage education for the children we serve and the reading program at Camp Bennett is designed to that end. Our goal is to provide incentives for the children to continue reading year-round. In the fall we provide backpacks full of school supplies to hundreds of children, and this year our goal is to start more than 850 young minds on the right path as school begins.

To keep up with our ever-changing and growing ministries our staff is in need of continuing education, which we are often able to assist through the Kohlmeier Fund for Christian dedication to excellence among these faithful students of the Word.

This ongoing and growing commitment to education would not be possible without your support. As we plan our move to a new facility, education is a key consideration during each step, and we continue to rely on our faithful volunteers and donors to ensure we continue to provide quality instruction and training for all those we serve.
