

# DC Ministries Combine to Better Serve Poor and Hurting People

he Board of Directors and staff of Central Union Mission are pleased to announce that we have joined forces with the former Gospel Rescue Ministries (GRM) to provide even more help for our city's poor and homeless population. According to Roy Wright, Central Union Mission board president, "This is truly a case of the sum being greater than its parts. We are honored to expand our services through the legacy of GRM."

In this partnership, GRM transfers two of its properties to the care and oversight of Central Union Mission: The 20bed Gospel Mission House, renamed in honor of GRM's long history of service, and the Lambert House, offering five apartment units available to poor families. Central Union Mission will also continue GRM's *Ready to Work*, a successful program that employs men and women in beautifying four Washington, DC, neighborhoods: H Street, Deanwood Heights, Dupont Circle and Mount Vernon Triangle.

According to David Van Duzer, chairman of GRM's board of trustees, "This new cooperation between the two charities will permit the best services of each organization to continue under the guidance and vision of Central Union Mission. There is no better organization than Central Union Mission to continue our tradition of offering hope, refuge and healing in Christ's name to those who need it most."

## A Second Chance and a Full-Time Job

ince Walmart opened its hiring center in Washington, DC, in mid-September, more than 11,000 people applied for the 300 positions available at each of the six new stores. Aaron Green, a Central Union Mission Special Circumstances participant, was among the first of the initial 200 hired at Store 5968 at Georgia and Missouri Avenues, NW, slated to open in early December. After two days on the job, his boss encouraged him to apply for a management position, and he was hired as the Frozen and Dairy department manager.

When Aaron came to the Mission, he didn't have any addictions, but he wanted some help turning his life around. Aaron started in the Spiritual Transformation Program (STP) after a pastor suggested it to his mother, but he was put out of the program when he did not seriously commit to the work.

Back on the street, he realized he wanted to be able to help his 29-year-old daughter and two young grandsons, so he decided to try again. This time the Mission accepted him into the Special Circumstances program, which permits a man to stay at the Mission for up to six months to save money from his job.

During his time at Central Union Mission, Aaron became a Christian and now worships with his mother at Reid Temple AME Church in Glenn Dale, MD. Aaron will continue to stay at the Mission as a Work Program participant until he has enough savings for his own living situation. His family is "so happy" that he has a steady position, and he is thrilled to be able to support them—especially at Christmas time. Aaron thanks the Lord "for the opportunity to be at the Mission and for the Mission's pushing me" to succeed.

## God Has Been Good to Us!

If you had told me just three years ago that today we would be poised on the edge of a miracle, I might not have believed you. The economy was dismal; many people were unemployed and hungry. Gentrification was squeezing the Mission out of our neighborhood of 30 years. Some community leaders were adamantly against us in our quest to find a new location to serve the poor, the lost and the hurting. How could anything change in just three vears?

Yet, here we are, enjoying another reminder that God's ways are not our ways. Here's what happened:

- After much opposition and a few false starts, we found and renovated an historic building in the heart of the city—where the most needy gather. Homeless men are now living in a state-of-the-art shelter just two blocks from Union Station!
- To accommodate more needy people, we relocated our administrative staff to an attractive office environment

• And with all the challenges we thought we faced, God saw fit to entrust us with more resources to serve the least of these. We acquired additional property, programs and staff by partnering with Gospel Rescue Ministries. With our combined expertise and resources, we can effect exponential improvements in the lives of homeless men and poor families.

#### Three things I know for sure:

First, God is good. "For I know the plans I have for you," declares the Lord, "plans to prosper you and not to harm you, plans to give you hope and a future" (Jeremiah 29:11.)

**Second,** our donors are faithful. You are committed to following God's command to minister to "the least of these."
