chedules are markedly full during the holiday season. Christmas parties, work celebrations, church events, and family traditions provide opportunity to treasure moments with loved ones. Amidst the bustle of gift giving and feasting, often the costliest gift one can give is time. This Christmas, Central Union Mission volunteers gave generously in this way though the Mission's holiday events.

The annual Christmas Bag event was a huge success, largely because of many volunteers who eagerly came alongside Mission staff to provide bags to 1,337 children in time for Christmas. Whether sponsoring a child or family, wrapping gifts, or aiding with distribution, donors gave sacrificially of their time and resources to bless others. About 40 volunteers from Immanuel Bible Church in Springfield, Virginia and Mt. Jezreel Baptist Church in Silver Spring, Maryland made the December 15 distribution event a huge success. On December 22, more volunteers joined the Hispanic Family Ministry for their Spanish-language distribution. Mission friends young and old

eagerly shared their smiles, songs, and lifting muscles at these events.

"Christmas Bags is a whole lot of fun," said Outreach Coordinator Shelah Wilcox, who oversaw the program. "Everybody is in the Christmas spirit. It makes it easier for me, because they want to work hard and enjoy what they're doing."

The Mission community also received one of its largest gifts of time from the 75 volunteers

who came to celebrate Christmas dinner together. For men in the Spiritual Transformation Program (STP) who are unable to return to family or Overnight Guests who find themselves homeless at Christmas, the Mission extends an open hand of hospitality through volunteers who host tables, sing carols, and serve dinner. Over 200 people attended the meal to honor the greatest gift of Jesus Christ.

"Every year I am encouraged by the presence of so many of our friends on Christmas Day," said Executive Director David Treadwell. "I realize that people could spend the day at home, but they choose to be with us—with the 'least of these'—and that says a lot about their priorities."

With the generous support of donors like you, Central Union Mission provided the following services to the community from October 1 – December 31, 2007:

- 33,930 nutritious meals for men, women, families and children
- Outreach to 1,337 children through distribution of Christmas Bags
- Support to 1,339 families and individuals in need through clothing & household goods distribution
- Residential recovery services through the 18-month Spiritual Transformation Program for 71 men overcoming addictions and other issues
- A safe place to sleep, food to eat, clothing to wear, and other supportive services for 361 men through the Overnight Guest Ministry
- Coordinated appropriate housing for 4 individuals and families through our

- Hispanic Family Ministry and Homeless to Housing Initiative
- Counseling services for 860 families and individuals including individual counseling, group counseling, family counseling, home visits and hospital visits.
- Free medical and legal services for 155 individuals including health fairs, exams and consultations.
- Educational services for 118 adults including English as a Second Language, literacy, and GED training.
- Community development projects in partnership with other organizations such as World Vision DC and Feed the Children, including food distribution at Macfarland Middle School

I want to assure you that Central Union Mission has adequate food for the poor and needy who come our way and that we are extremely grateful for the outpouring of financial support we received during the Christmas and year-end season. We are also grateful for the scores of volunteers who joined us for our fall events and upheld our ministry in prayer. You truly bless us. We were once again overjoyed by the love shared with over 1,300 children through the Mission's Christmas Bag program and by the packed house for Christmas dinner with presents for all our overnight guests.

Like most nonprofit organizations, we now enter one of two "lean" seasons of the year (late summer being the other). As utility costs peak and holiday giving slows, we rely on continued support from our donors who realize that poverty presents unique challenges

As we enter into 2008, we face exciting and diverse opportunities. Our relocation efforts are taking dynamic twists and turns as we fulfill our pledge to provide state-of-the-art services for Washington's poor and homeless. Senior Ministry Director James Lewis has provided strong leadership to improve the efficiency of our ministries as we serve increased numbers of hurting people. And we are confident that we can continue feeding many hungry neighbors largely through the efforts of Grace Calloway, our partner at Heaven's Grocery Store, and Food Services Manager Jeff Tooles who work tirelessly to gather food donated throughout the region.

In the coming year of *The Missionary*, we'll be featuring the leadership team who use their gifts to direct our ministries in service and excellence. In this issue, you have the chance to get to know our Senior Director, Barfonce Baldwin, who has our development and outreach staff humming in spite of the growth and challenges we continually face.
