ur 125th anniversary is a precious opportunity to thank you for your valuable support and to share the full measure of our ministry with you.

We see the great need for more compassion every day: Men are desperate for jobs, freedom from drugs, more education, even for their next meal and a place to sleep. The need for our services continues to grow. At the same time, we are increasingly burdened by inadequate facilities and lack of space. It breaks my heart when we have to put out the sign announcing that we're full for the night. It's a sign that means someone may go without a clean bed, a hearty meal, a hot shower—and hope.

Many of our fellow Washingtonians are begging for our compassion. Our

President has rightly pressed us to volunteer—and we offer you many opportunities—but our goal for the campaign goes even further. God calls us to care for the poor and to have hearts of compassion.

I am asking you to do four things throughout this season:

- 1. Pray that hearts will be touched like never before.
- 2. Join us for a campaign event—we'd love to see you in person!
- Share your compassion stories with friends, family, co-workers and others.
- 4. Continue to remember the poor in everything you do (Gal. 2:10).

- Central Union Mission is the oldest social service agency in the nation's capital.
- Peter McSweeney, the Mission's first success story, committed his life to Christ in January 1885.
- The Mission once ran an emergency home for children.
- Camp Bennett was opened in 1934, during the height of the Great Depression.
- Central Union Mission is a gospel rescue mission ministry. In 2008, North America's rescue missions provided 16.9 million nights of lodging and 48.4 million meals—enough to feed the entire population of Texas twice.

Founded in 1884, Central Union Mission is the oldest social service agency in Washington, DC. 

Remembering an "Angel"

lizabeth "Lee" Kirkpatrick, a Washington, DC, native, was already an accomplished professional photographer when she dedicated herself to serving the needy in her home town. Before she died unexpectedly at age 44 this April, she was known to her beneficiaries as the "Angel of Logan Circle." She frequently walked the four miles from her residence to this popular congregating spot for homeless people, distributing sandwiches and cash as she was able.

In admiration of Mother Teresa, Lee became associated with the Missionaries of Charity and the Sisters of Mercy convents, where she served hospice patients and children as well as the poor. To further her compassionate service, she earned a Certificate in Practical Nursing and worked as a primary caregiver for her stepfather.



Lee's family selected Central Union Mission to receive memorial gifts for Lee because they believe that Central Union Mission's help for the homeless is in line with Lee's own dedication and generosity. Located only four blocks from Logan Circle, the Mission will continue to serve those dear to Lee's and God's hearts.

I grew up in Southeast DC with my mother and nine brothers and sisters. As a single parent, my mother turned to Central Union Mission for help. We attended meetings on Saturday mornings, received Thanksgiving baskets and Christmas gifts. I was 5 years old the first time I attended Camp Bennett. At Camp Bennett we sang songs about

Jesus—songs about His faithfulness that would carry me through tough times ahead.

My siblings and I had no idea the impact Camp Bennett would have on our lives. The Lord began to put a deep desire in my heart to teach. Last year, I served as a camp counselor, and this year I am going to be the Senior Girls' Counselor! If it wasn't for God using Camp Bennett to plant seeds, there is no telling how I would have ended up. Thank you for sponsoring children and giving them a chance to make a difference in life.



I was in crisis and living in a safe house on North Capitol Street when someone told me about Central Union Mission. They said it's a good place to get back up on your feet. I lived there as an overnight guest for six or seven months. At that time, the Mission paid for me to go back to North Carolina to see my children. Now I'm living in a rooming house and looking for a place to live and a job.

I like to get by Central Union Mission every day to see my friends and keep in touch with Pastor Howard. Central Union Mission is the best shelter in the city: it's clean and safe, the people are helpful and they don't judge you by your looks.
