Fall Focus on Men's Ministries

Although Central Union Mission helps people of all ages, it is mostly known for its men's emergency shelter and recovery programs. In this issue, we share about the services the Mission offers men through compassionate donors like you.

Overnight Guests who need more than the basics have access to rehabilitation, medical, dental and mental health care. Next, the **Spiritual Transformation Program** (STP) provides education, literacy and counseling with a spiritual foundation. In the **Ready2Succeed** programs, where they earn a wage and are trained in baking, cooking, recycling, cleaning or landscaping. After that, a student is ready to gain a productive job and live on his own. Steve and Shawn are living testimony to how with God's help, a Mission guest can have a restored life:

Steve Powell

Steve was beaten down. He had recently survived an ugly divorce that ruined his reputation, lost him his job and left him homeless. He was grateful to complete the STP, then he volunteered as a front desk clerk and shower manager. He then joined the Mission's Ready2Work program, where he was hired by the Mt. Vernon Triangle CID to be on their Clean Team. His job is to keep the community clean—in rain, shine, heat or snow. In April 2017, he won the Clean Team's award for his outstanding performance.



Steve qualified for a Habitat for Humanity one-bedroom condo in Northeast DC. Having his own home has made it possible for him to re-connect with his 16-year-old son who lives in Silver Spring. Mr. Powell says that Central Union Mission taught him about dealing well with people. He says, "Life is all about kindness. If you're real with others, they can see that and are more open to your guidance. I like to share all that I've learned."

Shawn Chinn

When Shawn was honorably discharged from the Army, frustration and boredom led him to experiment with drugs. Before long he was bouncing in and out of jail. "Drugs didn't help my climb: they just gave me a shovel, and I



kept digging," he explains. At his final release, he picked Central Union Mission from a list of shelters because he was told it was the cleanest.

He learned about the STP during his first meal at the Mission. "That was the defining moment for me. I knew I couldn't recover on my own. I realized I needed Jesus; I knew He could help me."

After he completed the STP, Shawn attended Lincoln College of Technology and graduated with highest marks. While in school, the Mission assistant director continues on page 2

Today Shawn works with Ecolab repairing and installing commercial kitchen equipment. He and Dené are raising their daughter Moriah and son Elijah in the house they own in MD. They both serve at Shechem Covenant Outreach Ministries in Forestville, MD, and are close to their family nearby.

Shawn calls the Mission "a great launching pad. You can come let the Spirit of God work on you and be watched over because the Mission takes care of necessities that support life. God's hand is on this place."

Overnight Guests Ministry

Men can reserve beds through the daily intake process.

After an initial 30-day stay, they go on a two-week in and out rotation to encourage them to find permanent housing.

Work Programs

The **Work Program** is for guests who have full-time jobs but no place to live. They receive a reserved bed for 90 days and are required to save half of their earnings to secure permanent housing after leaving the Work Program.

In the **Work Therapy Program**, ten guests can work parttime supporting Mission-related activities. They save half of their earnings toward permanent housing and are required to seek full-time employment (or transition into another program) by the end of their one-year term.

The **Special Circumstances Program** is for men involved in school, training or part-time employment.

Extended Support Program participants have mental illness, cognitive impairment and/or physical impairment and are eligible based on the Mission's ability to support them. The Mission assists them with obtaining health and income benefits and suitable employment.

Spiritual Transformation Program (STP)

STP is a residential rehabilitation program that can accommodate 50 students in Bible study, biblical counseling, regular drug testing and work therapy. Classes or tutoring are provided in reading, writing, math, job readiness and computer skills

Men then seek employment and are mentored through a gradual transition into the community. The STP encourages a commitment to a local church to deter relapse and ensure continued growth and accountability.

Ready2Succeed

Ready2Succeed training programs provide job experience and references, as well as saving wages for permanent housing while boarding at the Mission:

Ready2Work is a street-cleaning and beautification service provided by homeless men and women for the Business Improvement Districts in the city. Ready2Recycle employees pick up and sort donations for the Ministry Resource Center and for sale to benefit the Mission's programs. Ready2Cook offers two options: Mission Muffins is a bakery run by homeless employees and the Culinary Job Training Program sponsored in partnership with DC Central Kitchen, which prepares people for professional kitchen employment. ■
