Joe Mettimano To be New Mission **Executive Director**

ITH GRATEFULNESS, Central Union Mission introduces to our friends and supporters Joseph J. Mettimano, our new executive director. Joe Mettimano has the broad background of an executive experienced in non-profit management. His former work includes marketing, fundraising, advocacy, leadership and partner-building in organizations as familiar as Global Impact, The Pew Charitable Trust, Prison Fellowship, World Vision, UNICEF-USA and the Association for the Advancement of Science. Yet his modesty makes a first impression.

Joe recognized the call to serve at a young age and has spent his life and career helping people in need around the world. His work with the homeless has been a vital part of his life: for the past six years he

has served as a pastor on the streets in Washington, DC, where he preaches every Wednesday night and leads a weekly outreach with food distribution and a time of fellowship.

He is a committed follower of Jesus Christ and a licensed and commissioned pastor receiving formal ministerial ordination this summer. He serves as an elder and associate pastor at The Orchard Church (Arlington, VA). In addition to 28 years non-profit experi-

ence, he served causes as varied as global poverty, prisoners, malaria, child trafficking, land mines and the environment.

He has lived in the Washington, DC, area for the past 28 years and currently resides in Herndon, VA, with his wife Cam-Vien and daughter Ella. According to Mission **Board President Roy**

to see the energy and innovation that Joseph will bring to the Mission. With his leadership, we can continue strong in our nearly 135-year history helping poor people experiencing homeless in the nation's capital."

From the **Director Emeritus**

We're Connected H. Patricia Blackshire

LYNN BURKE WAS BORN and raised in Washington, DC, and was referred to Central Union Mission at the suggestion of his pastor. Flynn had hit rock bottom and was spiraling out of control living on the streets of DC. In fact, his pastor found him--much to Flynn's shock--in a crack house. Flynn says the pastor stated emphatically, "This is not how you spend your lunch hour." He took Flynn out of there and led him to Central Union Mission.

Flynn's downfall began after his mother passed away in 2003. He started experimenting with drugs that led to a life of crime. He tells that it took him a moment to get adjusted to his new environment at the Mission; he confessed that he was not a ready convert. Initially, he spent a lot of time not communicating to other staff members. The love and support was so strong, however, that he eventually came out of his shell.

Seeking God's Peace

As part of his Mission program, he spent six months at Camp Bennett Camp, in Brookeville, MD. Away from the city, the camp offered serenity. He says, "It was the first time in my life that I experienced 'quiet time,' as I was used to being in a constant chaotic environment." He credits the spiritual teachings by the counselors and staff at Central Union Mission in bringing him closer to God. The Bible teachings were mind-altering and made him truly grasp that selfreflection was a meaningful way of assessing his past life and moving forward with Christ's help.

One of the things that he learned was that spending six months in solitude gave him a chance to be honest with himself and to ask himself the questions that really scared him, like, "What am I doing with my life?" He began to read the Bible more, and his personality blossomed. Central Union Mission readied Flynn for a productive life outside of the men's shelter, where he stayed from 2003-2007. After graduating from the Spiritual Transformation Program, he spent an extra year working at Central Union Mission to be certain that he had the tools to be successful.

Flynn is currently working as a bus driver in Washington, DC, employed for approximately ten years. He visits Central Union regularly and participates in a monthly Bible study class there. He is also involved in a ministry program at his own church.

Over a De<u>cade on the Job</u>

Flynn is engaging and friendly. He has a lot of pride and love for Central Union, and he speaks very highly about everyone involved in the program. He stays in touch with the many people that had an impact on his life, and he can impressively call out their names--even though he left over ten years ago! He also credits his daughter in beautiful, glowing terms, who he says believed in him from start to finish.

As a bus driver, he sometimes makes referrals to Central Union Mission. He shares what he learned from Central Union Mission to those he sees on the streets who are obviously struggling and in need of God. He says Central Union Mission changed his life and that he and the Mission are connected for life.
