Finding a Pathway to Success

HE HOMEWORK WAS SHORT but important: Who can you list as a job reference? In this *PATH-WAYS* to *Employment and Education* class, a one-week program designed by Dr. Cheryl Cook-Posley, senior director of Workforce Development and Education, students are learning the skills necessary to secure and sustain employment, higher education or vocational training.

Volunteer Dr. Robert Mackay, economics professor and consultant, is teaching this class today with the help of Employment and Education Coordinator Dana Thompson and volunteer business professionals Ellen Bredt and Laurie Larson-Jackson.

Networking is Important

At a table in the Mission chapel, four students talk about creating a job network from scratch. They discuss their backgrounds and brainstorm who would be their best candidates. Chris says that his job didn't end so well. Dr. Mackay replies that this is a good time to reconcile. Apologize to the employer for any trouble you caused, then tell about your new situation and ask humbly if he would be a reference for you.

James is worried; his reference is from decades ago. Dr. Mackay responds, "Who else can you ask? What about me? What about the chaplains and job supervisors at the Mission?" James brightens as he realizes that "the Mission has his back."

The Larger Picture

The students learn that their character reflects on the people who serve as their references and on the Mission itself. "We are the pioneers; we are the example for those who come after us," comments Richard. It's a new responsibility for them.
