DONALD'S STORY

"You Did It without Me; Now Do It with Me"

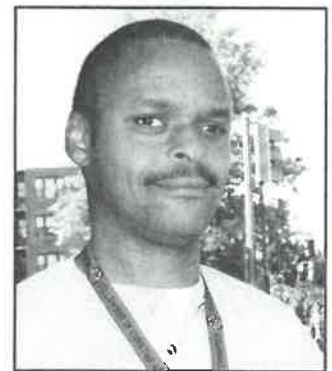
Central Union Mission brims over with stories of lives changed by the grace of God. Donald, 45, bears witness to one such story. Today, Donald is a Spiritual Transformation Program (STP) graduate and Mission intern. But when he came to the Mission, he was homeless, lonely, and caught in unhealthy cycles.

After working in the DC area at a furniture store, funeral home, and cleaning company, Donald was laid off. Without a high school diploma, he found it difficult to secure a job.

"I couldn't pay my rent, so I was evicted. That's what brought me to the Mission," explained Donald. He had quickly learned how tough it is on the street. He speaks from both experience and pain when he says: "Being homeless ain't no joke!"

After visiting the Mission many times for a place to sleep, he decided to enter the Spiritual Transformation Program. He found the STP challenging, but as he saw his faith in Jesus bear fruit, he persevered. When asked what helped him the most, Donald immediately testifies, "My Lord and Savior, because He is the one who brought me through this program."

At one point, Donald seriously considered quitting the STP, but he and others prayed for God's help. He asked God to send somebody to help him. The same day, God answered his prayer when news arrived that a tutor had volunteered to help him learn to read. Now Donald sees tutors four days a week for literacy training. His personal struggles to continued on page 2

ministry with a new, long term home for Central Union Mission. Since leaving our 60-year Pennsylvania Avenue home via eminent domain in the early 80's, we have longed for a facility designed as a Rescue mission, where we can properly meet the needs of those we serve in creative and state-of-the-art ways. And at last, plans for this dream facility are unfolding.

Yet even as we look toward the future with great expectations, we are committed to maintaining consistent services to those who rely on us. One of the key factors in our desire to relocate rather than continue to repair our current headquarters is the advantage of uninterrupted operations through the relocation from our current location while the new facility is being constructed. There is also

a major cost savings as we will not need to lease temporary space or close our doors for many months during the construction of our new facility.

As this annual report edition of our newsletter reveals, thousands of people come to us throughout the year for the wide variety of services we provide in a caring, Christian environment. Our elderly guests at our Seniors Luncheon, the struggling moms who depend on Food Depot, our 82 overnight guests, the veterans awaiting treatment, and participants in our Spiritual Transformation Program will continue to receive our support and ministry uninterrupted through this relocation.

We are blessed and excited by this opportunity and ask that you hold us up in prayer as the Lord leads us through this process. complete the STP and focus on his reading have taught Donald a valuable lesson about patience.

“God is good, but you have to give Him your time and patience,” says Donald. “God calls us by saying: ‘Let Me guide your life. You did it without Me, now do it with Me. You’ll see a difference.’”

By following God’s guidance through the STP, Donald has also become free from his chain-smoking addiction and reconnected with his family, who attended his graduation from the STP in December 2005.

Although Donald has come a long way, he still has high hopes for the future. His current goals include reading at a 12th grade level and obtaining his General Equivalence Degree (GED). One day, he hopes to get a drivers license, a permanent job and home, and perhaps marry and start a family. As he pursues his goals, Donald is interning in the Mission’s Maintenance Department. He takes great pride in

the many projects he has helped complete around the facilities.

Like all of us, Donald is a work in progress. But his experience at Central Union Mission has given him every reason to continue to trust God to heal and restore his life. From that first safe place to sleep and hot meal, to reconnecting with his family and graduating from the STP, to his ongoing literacy and vocational training, Donald can point to many ways God helped him at the Mission.

Legal Aid Re-Launches Mission Services

In the past year, Central Union Mission's Legal Aid services have undergone significant changes. With recent developments, local lawyers are able to help their neighbors at the Mission find justice when it seems like a far off dream.

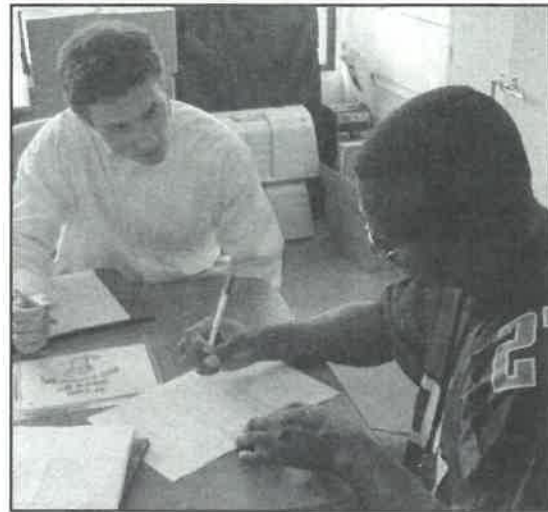
"As Christians, we are called to do justice," said DCCLA participant and lawyer Sam Logan. "As lawyers, we have been given the keys to the justice system through our education, experience, and membership in the legal community. As Christian lawyers, then, we are called to put these legal assets to work to promote justice, especially for those who wouldn't otherwise have access to the legal system."

This past summer, thanks to the partnership of DC Christian Legal Aid (DCCLA), the Mission hosted three monthly sessions to serve the legal needs of participants in the Mission's Spiritual Transformation Program and Overnight Guest program. DCCLA is a ministry of Christian law professionals in the Washington area, which serves the legal needs of underprivileged people in the Washington Metropolitan area.

During the sessions, clients receive one-on-one consultation with legal professionals regarding issues relating to civil rights, immigration, criminal history, disability insurance, and more. Lawyers provide general counsel, make phone calls on behalf of clients, and provide referrals.

"Many of the people we met with just needed to talk their problems through with someone. For those people, our job was to listen. Others have genuine legal problems that we can address right there in the meeting or by a simple phone call the next day," said Logan.

The Mission looks forward to continuing to provide these vital services to those we serve through the DCCLA. Monthly events are continuing through the fall with hopes of strategically expanding services soon.

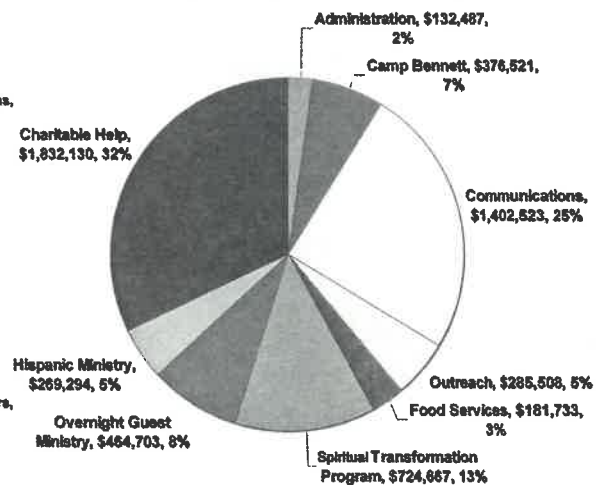
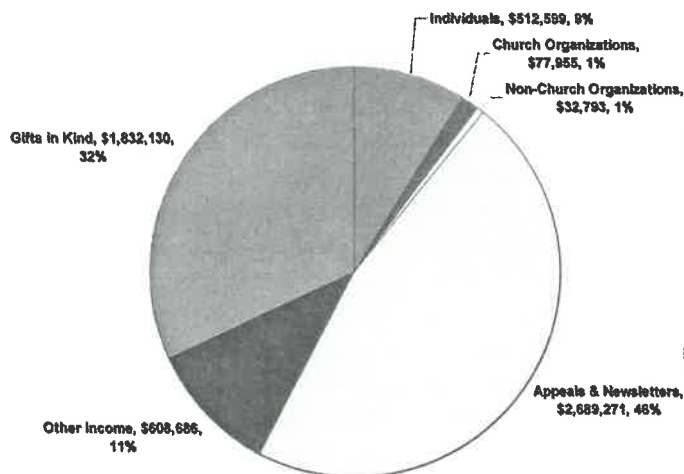


By offering personal consultations with lawyers such as Sam Logan, Christian Legal Aid helps individuals address a wide array of legal matters.

Overnight Guest Ministry: Grace in Time of Need

When Emmett first came to the Mission this year, he was in poor health and soon discovered that he needed surgery. Through the Overnight Guest Ministry, Emmett accepted Jesus Christ for the first time, and came to believe that God would provide him a home. According to Pastor James Lewis, Director of Overnight Guests, Emmett was "just on fire!" Through his time with the Overnight Guest Ministry and God's saving grace, Emmett was able to move into his own apartment. He finally underwent his much-needed surgery and was able to spend two full weeks recovering in his new home.

Every evening the Overnight Guest Ministry welcomes over 80 men for a hot meal, warm shower, clean clothes, and a safe place to sleep for the night. Along with the immediate physical needs that are met, the men are offered counseling, clinical care, legal counsel, and the opportunity to consult with an in-house social worker.

Most importantly, however, they receive the Word of God and the chance to accept Jesus Christ as their personal Savior. There is nightly worship, led by Washington area churches, Bible study, and pastoral counseling for those in need. "It's the Gospel," said Pastor Lewis in response to why the program works.

In September the Mission held a three-day revival in partnership with First Baptist Church of Glenarden. Over 300 men gathered in the Mission chapel for worship, testimonies, speakers, and thanksgiving. Over 20 men accepted Christ. The revival was followed by a weekend retreat at Camp Bennett, where 30 men from the ministry were able to escape the city to

enjoy the beautiful fall weather, outdoor recreation, and worship services. In early May, the Overnight Guest Ministry paired up with McLean Bible Church and held a retreat at the Rocky Gap Conference Center in Cumberland, Maryland.

Social Work Department: **Making Connections**

This year the Social Work Department gained a new addition in social worker Jermaine Wyatt, and since his arrival, the Mission has been able to provide more individualized case management to participants in our Men's Ministry.

For example, the Social Work Department opened a case with David who was incarcerated for most of his life, and struggled for many years with substance abuse. Over time, many of his fam-

ily relationships were torn to pieces. He arrived at the Mission after being released from prison, and came to the Social Work Department with hopes of starting over. The Social Work Department provided David with counseling, independent housing, food assistance, and linkage to various other services through networking. We were also able to reunite him with his brother after six years of estrangement. David now lives independently as a productive citizen in society.

Spiritual Transformation Program: Strength for the Journey

During the past year, Central Union Mission's Spiritual Transformation Program was re-evaluated and reorganized to more effectively serve the men to whom it ministers. The most important shift in the program was the move from a time-driven curriculum approach to an individualized developmental approach. The five phases of the STP have been restructured into a three-tiered program comprised of Pre-Camp, Camp Bennett, and Post-Camp. These three phases are intended to focus on addiction recovery, spiritual guidance, and life-skills training, respectively.

"We're very excited about the recent changes in the STP Program," says Pastor Gregory Strong, Director of the STP. "Under the current restructuring we believe we will be better equipped to minister to the men holistically versus just providing biblical instruction. Our goal is always to make a good program better."

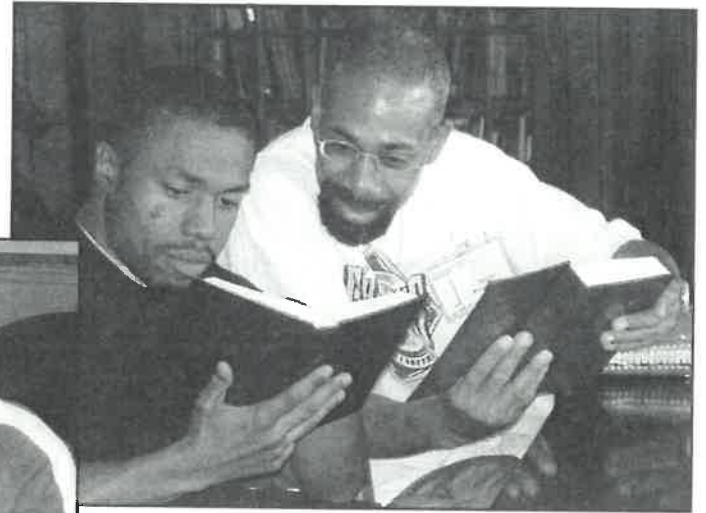
From July 1, 2005 to June 30, 2006, the STP graduated 16 men. Michael is a wonderful example of what the STP strives to accomplish in the lives of its participants. A native Washingtonian, Michael came into the STP in July 2004 after suffering from addictions. He was determined to change his life and completed the program in April 2005. Michael was subsequently accepted into the Excel Institute for Automotive Technology Training to receive his



Automotive Service Excellence Certification. Michael is doing well in the program and works part-time as a custodian cleaning government offices and as a supervisor at the Mission.

God has blessed Michael with the opportunity to restore his life and move toward self sufficiency. He sets an example for the men he continues to work with at the Mission. Stories like Michael's reflect the heart of the STP's work and encourage us to continue loving, serving, and assisting men to become more whole in Christ—spiritually, physically, emotionally, and mentally.

New arrivals to the STP are taught the basics of life in Christ and fleeing the temptations of the streets.

During the last year, the Social Work Department moved 36 men from homelessness to housing, reunited 5 families, provided 418 counseling sessions, with ongoing group counseling and employment assistance for 15 men. The Social Work Department assists with goal setting, problem identification, resource development, mental/health referrals, counseling, family interventions, and advocacy.

All members of the Social Work Department are members of The National Association of Social Workers. The Department is small, but mighty in promoting the human welfare and leading people to Christ. The department is currently following up with Spiritual Transformation Program men who have transitioned out of the Mission into society. The Mission is excited to hear the great news about these men and their success.

Outreach Ministry: *Sharing God's Love in Word & Deed*

During the 2005-2006 Fiscal Year, our Outreach Ministry touched thousands of lives. While the Outreach Ministry serves families and seniors regularly through Food Depot, and Seniors Luncheon, special events are often the highlight of our ministry. At Christ on the Mall on July 4th, Central Union Mission staff, volunteers, and STP participants distributed thousands of bottles of water to thirsty tourists on the National Mall.

Operation Backpack kicked off during the summer, and thanks to our generous donors and volunteers, in August we were able to provide 467 children with backpacks full of school supplies.

At the Veteran's Day Luncheon in November, more than one hundred veterans were served a meal and participated in a service of honor by veterans from the national service organization, AmeriCorps. On November 19th, Mission staff members and STP participants walked to raise money for the Mission in the Fannie Mae Foundation Help the Homeless Walkathon.

And of course, every year we try to make the holidays a little brighter for those in need. Last year our annual turkey distribution program provided over 500 turkeys through Food Depot, Seniors Luncheon, and Hispanic Ministry. We also provided Thanksgiving dinner to over 200 people in the community. In December, our Christmas Bag program provided almost 1,400 bags of clothes and toys to children. God was truly good to us in our 2005-2006 Fiscal Year, and we are blessed to continue to reach out to hurting, lonely, hungry, and needy people through our ongoing services and special events.

Hispanic Ministry: ¡Gloria al Dios!

Since its move during the 2004-2005 Fiscal Year from the Central Union Mission main facility to Freedom Baptist Church, the Hispanic Ministry has experienced tremendous growth due to new proximity to those it serves and a fantastic relationship with Freedom Baptist Church. In 2005-2006,

twelve new volunteers joined our team to fill critical functions on a weekly basis. Many of these volunteers come from the Hispanic community itself, and others simply walked by the building and were drawn toward the flurry of activity. Our

volunteers make translation, clothing distribution, ESL classes, and literacy instruction possible for those we serve through the Hispanic Ministry.

The Hispanic Ministry continues to reach out to various churches and organizations in the area to share the work that the ministry is doing and invite others to join us. Highlights from the 2005-2006 Fiscal Year at the Hispanic Ministry include three successful community health fairs and an Easter Picnic at Camp Bennett for 150 families. Overall, the Hispanic Ministry has had a tremendous year, and looks forward to improving the quality and quantity of services available to the Hispanic community in the coming year.

Every summer, Camp Bennett comes to life with the arrival of hundreds of campers aged eight to twelve, eager to play hard and learn much. During the 2005-2006 Fiscal Year, Camp Bennett welcomed 228 Washington area children who might not have otherwise been able to leave the city for a week of camp. These children treasure the nature hikes, ropes course, Bible studies, pool time, worship services, cabin activities, crafts, and good food that fill their week at Camp Bennett.

Many ask to come back time and time again! The positive experiences of several of our campers, such as 13-year-old Paulo Sosa, have lead to the establishment of the Counselor-in-Training program for children who have outgrown Camp but are interested in preparing to give back as junior counselors once they turn sixteen.

Throughout the year, local churches, sports teams, schools, and scouting troops continued to utilize the Camp facilities. Also, now that the Spiritual Transformation Program has increased the emphasis of its Camp phase, the year-round use of the Camp facilities will continue to expand.
