# For Such a Time as This

HE MISSION CARED FOR OUR NEIGHBORS in the aftermath of the Civil War, during the Spanish Flu of 1918, through two World Wars and other crises. Today, we are committed to protecting all people in our care from the effects of COVID-19.

### Will the Mission stay open?

The coronavirus emergency has changed life for all of us in many unsettling ways. We want to assure you that, in the midst of this upheaval, Central Union Mission stands firm. We are committed to serving lost and hurting souls in our community—no matter the challenges we face. We remain open and fully operational, sheltering the homeless and feeding the hungry.

We have an emergency contingency plan that will enable us to provide continuity of services as long as

we're able. Utilizing our camp and Lambert House properties if needed, we'll do all we can to ensure neighbors experiencing homelessness have a place to stay.

### What is the Mission doing to help?

We continue to shelter the homeless and feed the hungry. It is critical that we keep our already-vulnerable homeless and low-income neighbors safe. We are daily



checking the body temperature of both shelter guests and staff and sending anyone with a fever for a medical evaluation. We are requiring everyone to continue with standard protocols such as hand washing, no touching of the face and cleaning all hand surfaces.

Our Family Ministry Center continues to distribute desperately needed food to families in need. We have canceled all volunteer activities and social functions like Seniors Fellowship, book clubs and English classes, etc. Many of these program participants are older, and we want to limit their exposure. As well, we continue to accept all gifts-in-kind at the Family Ministry Center (3194-B Bladensburg Rd., NE).

# What Can You Do?

HE CORONAVIRUS OUTBREAK has impacted the Mission in unexpected ways. Regular financial giving is down as people feel unsettled about the future. We are short on food and cleaning supplies because grocery stores are empty from hoarding. Our staff is overburdened because our usual volunteers can't come in to work.
