Dennis found the answers he'd been looking for his whole life — thanks to YOU!

When Dennis walked through the doors of Central Union Mission in 2020, he was 56 years old. His life had been a long and treacherous journey. But finally he was in a place where he could find peace, experience personal restoration and reconnect with God.

Like so many who come to the Mission for help, Dennis' journey had started with a dysfunctional family — alcoholic parents, feelings of abandonment and low self-esteem. He'd spent his life looking for answers in all of the wrong places. And, as you might imagine, found few.

Although he watched his mom and dad struggle with drinking, he ended up following in their footsteps. "It was all I knew and all I saw," he says. "Even though I hated it, I became them."

As the years of failure, guilt and confusion piled up, Dennis found himself deeply depressed, estranged from his family and sickened by his "legacy." He was deeply stung by the imprisonment of a son.

The final straw: 30 days' notice to vacate his apartment in the wake of a job loss due to the COVID lockdown. Finally realizing that rock bottom was closer than it had ever been before, he came to Central Union Mission, hoping to rebuild his shattered life and reconnect with Jesus Christ.

"After I got here, the foundation was laid," Dennis says. "I'll admit, I was still drinking when I first went, but they loved and prayed that out of me. I was able to find my true identity and also identify those triggers that would cause me to head back down the wrong path."

What's more, says Dennis, "It felt like home. I was just overwhelmed with how much they cared and how they took care of us."

Thanks to the Mission's successful Workforce Development Program, Dennis has earned his food handling certification and is taking online classes to further his culinary career. This will be absolutely crucial to his success. You can't move forward without work that pays a living wage that keeps a roof over your head and food in the cupboard.

Dennis has been clean for more than a year now and credits Central Union Mission for his sobriety. "If you're serious about getting your life together, Central Union Mission is where you need to be. They'll meet you where you are without any judgment. This is the happiest I've ever been in my life."
