

"The Mission literally saved my life"

Jerome never thought he'd end up struggling on the streets . . . your generosity gave him hope

The next thing Jerome remembers after jumping from the two-story building is waking up in the hospital with broken ribs.

It's no wonder Jerome attempted suicide. He was raised in extreme poverty by a violent, alcoholic father. "I grew up around nothing but abuse," he says.

Jerome was 7 years old the last time he saw his dad. "I

went into the basement and found him hanging from a rope," says Jerome. His father's suicide caused his mother to become emotionally unstable. Jerome was raised by his siblings for the rest of his childhood.

Jerome joined the Marine Corps when he turned 17. After he served for four years, he became a federal

officer for 19 years. During that time, Jerome's brother introduced him to Jesus. "My life changed when I opened the Bible. I couldn't put it down," he says.

But Jerome's life began to derail. Despite people's warnings, he gave up his home of 14 years to live with a woman he met. "I let my flesh control me instead of the word of God. It cost me everything," Jerome says.

"I never thought it would be me"

A month after Jerome moved in, she asked him to leave. He became homeless and lost his federal officer job. The drinking and cocaine use followed. "I never thought I would eat out of a trash can or sleep on a bench in an area I had once patrolled as an officer," says Jerome. "I never thought it would be me."

The loss of everything drove Jerome to jump from that building. But God used it as a wake-up call.

When he was released from the hospital, Jerome had no place to go. "I lost every worldly thing I had," says Jerome. "I only had a dirty shirt, dirty boxers, shoes that didn't fit me and a coat."

As he was leaving, he saw a sign for the Mission and felt the Lord tell him to go.

When Jerome arrived, the man at the front desk asked him if he knew Jesus and needed a place to stay. "I started crying," Jerome says. "I thought everyone in the world hated me."

Jerome experienced a feeling at the Mission he'd never known before: being cared for and loved without owing anything. "I truly learned about Jesus and His love," says Jerome. "My father never told me he loved me. For someone to really love me and ask nothing in return was mind-boggling to me."

When Jerome completed the program, he was asked to attend Camp Bennett as an intern for six months. He ended up staying and working as the camp's supervisor for five more years.

"The Mission literally saved my life," says Jerome.
"There are many dying every day on the street because they have lost hope. But because of the Mission, I know now there is hope for tomorrow."
